Here at JCPL, we are thankful for the opportunity to serve this community, not only as we have traditionally, but also in branching out to serve in new ways.

A good example of serving in new ways comes in the form of extending our services beyond the four walls of our building and making the effort to serve more segments of the community. Did you know that JCPL staff will have planned and delivered nearly 500 programs in the community? We reach the whole spectrum of ages, from visits to pre-schools and elementary classrooms to visits to retirement communities. All of this comes on top of our long-standing bookmobile service to the school system.

There is also a lot of good stuff going on within the four walls. A visit from Iditarod musher Karen Land in March, the Million Page Challenge this summer, and our Kindergarten Prep School are a few of the highlights of 2017. Did you know nearly 250 programs were offered in our building in 2017?

New databases were introduced this year: Mango Languages, A to Z Foods, NuWav Legal Documents. Our participation in the DVD transit program opened up a significant part of the Evergreen catalog to our patrons. Increasing the number of circulating wireless hotspots has allowed many in this community access to the Internet. A video game collection was introduced this fall and is being enjoyed by many.
